Peer Support Services

Woodrow's Project SOAR peer recovery supporters provide on-call support to emergency department patients who present with an opioid use disorder. Project SOAR initially provided in-person services in the Cleveland Clinic Lakewood and Lutheran hospital emergency departments. In response to the pandemic, peer recovery supporters now provide 24/7 video call services to the clients.



86% clients linked to treatment




Average Age: 18% Black 2%Other Race 38 years 16% Hispanic 63%Male, 16% Homeless 37% Female

Street opioids, prescription opioids, and cocaine were the most commonly used/misused drugs.

Follow-Up Surveys of Project SOAR Clients 30-day, 90-day, 6-month & 1-year (Years 2&3 Clients)

- Survey response was 14%-29%.
- Wanting a better life was most commonly cited reason to be in recovery.
- Associating with wrong company was the most commonly reported reason to return to substance use.



The most commonly reported barrier to treatment linkage was unwillingness of client at the time of encounter.

Woodrow Patient Navigator

- New initiative, started in **Year 3**.
- Assists **Woodrow residential clients** with services to promote recovery and independence.
- Served **28 clients**.
- All Women, average age of **39 years**, majority **non-Hispanic White**.
- 76% clients' needs addressed.
- Transportation, employment and housing - most commonly identified needs.

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
