Highlights from OD2A Evaluation findings for the Woodrow's Project SOAR Program Year One (September 2019-August 2020)

Peer Support Services

Woodrow's Project SOAR peer recovery supporters provide on-call support to emergency department patients who present with an opioid use disorder. Project SOAR initially provided inperson services in the Cleveland Clinic Lakewood and Cleveland Clinic Lutheran hospital emergency departments. In response to the pandemic, peer recovery supports now provide 24/7 video call services to these clients.



The evaluation examines Project SOAR's ability to engage, refer, and link clients to treatment.

Program Participation



Clients Engaged by Peer Recovery Supporters

All of the 178 clients encountered by peer recovery supporters agreed to participate in the program



Clients Referred


98% of engaged clients were referred to treatment services



Linkage to Treatment

86% of clients who received a referral were linked to treatment
