

Know Child's Lead Test Result:

0 - 3.4	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask the doctor when your child needs another lead test. • Call your health department to learn more about lead and how to make your home lead safe.
3.5 - 9	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Repeat lead test every 3 months until the level is less than 3.5. • Children with lead levels between 3.5 and 9 have an exposure to lead. • A health department nurse will call to talk about your child's lead level, answer questions and discuss ways reduce the lead level. • Talk with the doctor to schedule their next lead test. • Your child may be referred to Bright Beginnings.
10 - 14	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Repeat lead testing every 1-2 months until the level is less than 3.5. • A health department nurse will call to talk about your child's lead level, teach you about lead hazards, and ways to reduce your child's lead level. • The health department <u>must</u> check your home for lead paint hazards. • Your child may be referred to Bright Beginnings.
15 - 19	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Repeat lead testing every 1-2 months until the level is less than 3.5. • A health department nurse will call to talk about your child's lead level, teach you about lead hazards and ways to reduce your child's lead level. • The health department <u>must</u> check your home for lead paint hazards. • Your child may be referred to Bright Beginnings.
20 - 44	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Repeat lead testing every 2-4 weeks until the level is less than 3.5. • A health department nurse will call to talk about your child's lead level, teach you about lead hazards and ways to reduce your child's lead level. • The health department <u>must</u> check your home for lead paint hazards. • Your child is may be referred to Bright Beginnings.
45 or higher	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Your child must see a doctor or go to the hospital today. • Your child <u>must</u> be treated with medicine to help lower their lead level. • Your home <u>must</u> be checked for lead paint hazards as soon as possible. • A health department nurse will visit your home or talk to you by phone. • Your child is may be referred to Bright Beginnings.
