

About Ryan White

In 1984, Ryan White, at age 13, was one of the first hemophiliac children diagnosed with AIDS in the U.S.

Diagnosed in the early days of misinformation, his fight to attend school garnered international attention. Through his public battle, he challenged prevalent misconceptions about HIV/AIDS and, along with his mother, led a campaign to educate the public and increase awareness.

At the age of 18, Ryan White died in April 1990 just months before Congress passed the AIDS bill that bears his name.
